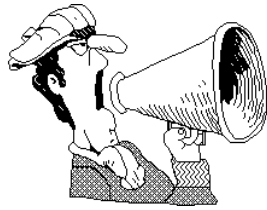

Cover Story

Focie Stover turned fifteen in the spring of 1932, and moved with her parents from Angerona, WV to Apple Grove, OH so her dad could share crop on a farm there. She met **Gerald Hayman** one Sunday afternoon in June during a group walk to church, and he walked her home from the evening service at Apple Grove Methodist Church. In October, **Focie's** family moved back to West Virginia, but she had already accepted **Gerald's** marriage proposal.

They were married November 2, 1932 in Ripley, WV, exactly four months before **Focie's** 16th birthday. They returned to Ohio the next day and lived with **Gerald's** brother and his wife until the day before Christmas when they set up housekeeping in the two room house pictured on the cover of this "Hayman Holler" (the picture was probably taken in the early 1960's before the gravel pits were dug).

The house was located on **Gerald's** Dad's farm where he worked, and they lived there five years – **Lillie** and **Phyllis** were both born there. Still on the farm, they moved to "the big house" where **Don** was born, to the "little white house" out on the hill where **Ted** was born, back to "the big house" where **Linda** was born, and then to the "Harold Hayman" place in East Letart about the time **Don** started to school in 1944. From there they moved to the Linscott place in Fairview, to the Foreman place in Fairview, to Middleport, to Syracuse, to the Bill Crow farm in Letart Falls, back to "the big house" in Apple Grove, to the Jonas Wolfe place, and finally to East Letart in August 1956 where **Keith** was born. This final move surprised **Gerald** -- he

came home after four days on the boat to an empty house -- **Don** with help from cousins and friends had already moved the Hayman family to East Letart.

Kelsey graduated from South Carroll High School this year and plans to attend Carroll Community College for a few years until she picks a major.

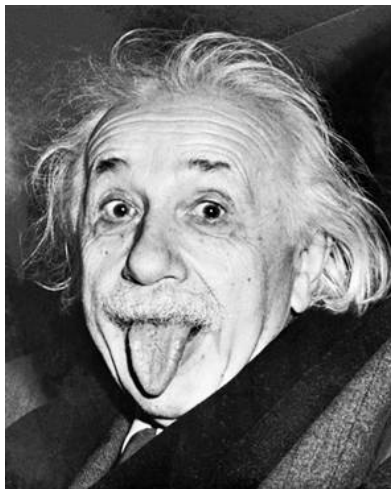

First off, I need to thank Brice for the idea for this story. Three or four years ago he said it would be pretty cool for me to do a story on what we do to get all set up for the big show on Saturday night. Here is the deal for the 2009 show.

It's the late part of April and we start making plans for our vacation. We ended up in Erie PA in May and stopped at Sky King and Phantom to get supplies, and on the way back home we stopped at Phantom in Youngstown, OH. Also in May we made a short trip to Eagle in Marietta. Yes, four different fireworks stores. On the boat in June it was time to start going over the song list from last year to see what songs we used and to delete and add songs to come up with about 30-35 minutes of music. I add them to a play list on my MP3 player and just listen to the song list over and over and think about each song and what to set off with each one. And, now the set up. This year I made up a better tube rack, from five tubes up to eight with a tighter fit for less chance of a tube falling over. Also, with more tubes we give them a little time to cool down after a mortar goes up by switching from one to another.

Now let's get to Saturday late afternoon. We are in the house opening a lot of boxes and unwrapping fuses and taking the tops off the repeater cakes. When we get finished the place looks like Christmas morning. Now let's get out to the launch site. I always use my tilt-bed trailer to angle the show away from the crowd so there is less chance of any thing coming back down on somebody's head. We try to be as safe as we can. If you look close you will see a large jug of water and a fire extinguisher that we hope we will never need.

And now the show. This year I am trying something new, a laser lite that Shane and I use on our DJ jobs. I did a little test out back and with some smoke in the air I think it will look pretty cool. Last year we ran across a better way to light a fuse. We use something called a pyro torch -- no more "click-click-click" with a long Bic lighter that wants to be fussy when we need to light a fuse.

Time to hook up the jam system. I hook our laptop into a 600 watt mixing amp. All the music is on a flash drive and played through the computer. We use four speakers, two facing our family crowd and the other two facing that rowdy bunch that watches from across the road. We like to start with something fast and loud just to get the show on the road. We try to use two cakes on each song and fill in with mortars.

And now the grand finale. I am sure by now that when the song "Imagine" starts playing, everyone knows the finale is coming up. The two large cakes for this will be 404 shots in the air with two large fountain cakes on the ground all at the same time. This is my favorite time, backing away and watching the night sky filled with color and kabooms and knowing that we have done another great job with "Hollow Blast".

Of course there is a lot more little details that go into the show, and with all of them Don and Brian would need to add two or three more pages to the Hayman Holler. Thanks Brice for the idea of "Hollow Blast" behind the scenes.

Woodstock

Imagine going to a concert that lasted three and a half days. For peace and music lovers of 1969, this was the place to be; it was called Woodstock.

Woodstock took place in Bethel, N.Y. at Max Yasgur's pasture forty years ago. It started at 5:07 p.m. on Friday, August 15th, and stretched through mid-morning on Monday the 18th. It took six months to plan for Woodstock and it cost \$500,000 to run the whole show. It was estimated that over 400,000 people showed up when they only expected 60,000. These people varied from anti-war protesters to Vietnam veterans and rednecks. All of these people endured little or no sleep, lack of food, sparse sanitation facilities, and drugs and alcohol. Also, over an hour of heavy rain with no shelter made the area covered with mud. With all of these people and their trash, it took less than five days to clean up the whole 600 acres.

The negative side of all of the peace and love was that there were three deaths; one by a heroine overdose, one by a ruptured appendix, and one run over by a tractor. But, on the bright side of it all, two babies were brought into the world. There were a few drug busts, but no reports of burglary. Trespassing was a definite problem though, and a judge did get his lights knocked out.

There were so many people there that traffic jams were up to twenty miles long, and some people had to walk 15 miles from their cars to the field. Some facts state that the cost was \$24 for a three day ticket and \$8 dollars for a one day ticket. The total tickets sold reached 186,000! Also, with over 400,000 people, there were only 600 port-o-johns, so you do the math. The farmer fired ten shots into the air because he was fed up with the noise. One crazy thing is that there were 10 million yards of stripped clothes!

There were thirty-one musical acts that included The Who, Blood Sweat and Tears, Janis Joplin, CCR, Santana, and Jimi Hendrix, with only forty minutes in between gigs.

Richie Haven was the first musician to kick off the three day event, with Jimi Hendrix playing the National Anthem and then fading into "Purple Haze" to end the whole event. Actually, Jimi Hendrix wasn't the first choice to end the whole shebang, it was supposed to be Roy Rogers with "Happy Trails", who Michael Lang the co-producer tried to book. The cost for some of these performers was \$1,500 dollars for Santana, \$7,500 for Grateful Dead, and \$11,200 dollars for The Who.

In 1994, Michael Wadleigh made a three-hour movie about Woodstock, and called it "Woodstock" -- go figure. This movie made over \$50 million dollars at the box office. The movie was so long that if you were to stretch out the film it would reach a length of 315,000ft! It included some opinions and views of the performers, music lovers, and last but not least, the hippies.

That Pretty Glass in Grandma's Cupboard!

From the time it graced department store windows such as Woolworth's or was distributed by gas stations and movie theaters as prizes, and later displayed in Grandma's cupboard, Depression Glass has found a distinctive place in America's homes. In an era of economic hardship, this glass caught American's fancy with its affordability and varied patterns and colors.

Depression Glass is historically important, as it was the first glass to be made completely by machine in the United States. Over twenty-five companies, located in Indiana, Ohio, and West Virginia, produced Depression Glass in the United States during the Depression years of the 1920s through 1940. Seven Depression Glass manufacturing companies made ninety-two different patterns: Federal, Hazel-Atlas, Hocking, Indiana, Jeanette, MacBeth-Evans, and U.S. Glass. Each company designed their own molds, and these patterns were not copied by other companies, so the pattern, and the colors in which it was produced are distinctive to that company.

Even the most frugal household in the Depression Era had a cream and sugar set or butter dish on their table. Such pieces were passed through the generations, as people nostalgically recall the pretty glass in their grandma's house. Recognized for its aesthetic value, unique beauty and design, the glass has become collectible. Browsing glass shows, antique shops, flea markets, yard sales, and now even eBay, shopping has become a treasure hunt.

It is a very sturdy glass, produced under the expectation of daily use. Decorative and functional by design, its place in your home need not only be in a display case. The enduring colors including (amber, blue, black, crystal, green, pink, red, yellow, and white) have never gone out of style. With proper care, pieces such as candlesticks, candy dishes, and vases can be used to decorate for the Holidays and other special occasions. Alone or mixed with china, Depression Glass makes a lovely table setting. Its availability and pricing has allowed it to be comparable with glassware currently manufactured, but Depression Glass carries a historical significance and individuality absent in new glass.

So whether the piece of Depression Glass you see is a piece handed down in your family, one that is sitting in an antique shop or glass show, or a recent purchase, when you look at a piece of Depression Glass, you are looking at a bit of American history.

Pomeroy-Mason Bridge: A Distant Memory

After years of waiting, they finally opened the Pomeroy-Mason Bridge on December 30, 2008. The new bridge is called “Bridge of Honor”, named after three people who served our country. The old bridge was built in 1928 and was a narrow two-lane road which nobody liked, and finally after years of planning and building the new bridge was done. There were a lot of delays due to weather, high water, and rock and mud slides. After it opened, Leslie, Shane, and Amber went down, crossed it, went to the Wal-Mart parking lot, turned around, and went back across it again. It is a lot different now driving across a four-lane bridge. On March 23rd they had a dedication of the new bridge with Gov. Ted Strickland of Ohio and Gov. Joe Manchin of West Virginia.

The old bridge was brought down with explosives, and removed in pieces. They blew up the center span on April 21st, the West Virginia side on May 14th, and the Ohio side on May 28th. That left a pier on each side; the Ohio pier was blown up on June 16th and the West Virginia pier came down June 17th.

The 80 year old bridge is now a distant memory for all of us. If you get a chance, check the new one out at night with the lights on – it’s amazing. Here is something interesting – the bridge is used by 10,000 cars per day, which means 3,650,000 cars a year. Note: Don was intrigued by the traffic pattern on the West Virginia side – one lane entering toward Ohio, one lane upriver, one lane downriver, and one lane to Wal-Mart.

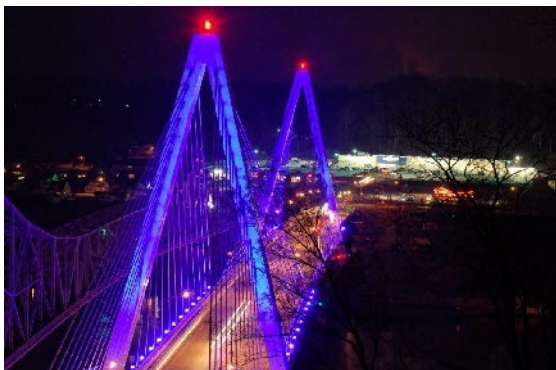

Auction House Hot Dog Sauce

- 1 regular bottle ketchup

Cook for 15 minutes and then add:

- 2 packages of saltine crackers, rolled fine.
- Heat through.
